Letter from 4-H Academic Coordinator for Volunteer Engagement Gemma Miner

April 27, 2022

Clover Content Creators, A New “SPIN” on Project Delivery

Hey there 4-H members! Are you looking for something to do this Summer? Would you like to learn how to shoot and edit your own videos? Maybe you’ve already made some videos of your own, but you’d like to take your skills to the next level. You can do that and more in the Clover Content Creators Special Interest (SPIN) Project. Join us starting July 8th for a 10-week, online project, delivered through Canvas, a web-based learning management system. Here are just a few of the topics you’ll cover:

- Digital Citizenship
- Social Media Platforms for Video
- Choosing the Right Equipment
- Storyboarding and Scripting
- Videography Basics: Types of Camera Shots, Camera Movements, Composition, Framing, Lighting, Sound
- Video Editing

At the end of this project, members will have a Content Creation Challenge: Create a short recruitment video, that encourages other youth to join the 4-H program and can be shared on social media during your county’s Fall 2022 enrollment drive.

Due to certain technical aspects and the online learning environment, this project is open to Junior, Intermediate, and Senior members only. Please complete the registration form [here](#) by Thursday, July 7th to enroll. Once your registration form is received, county staff will add you to the Clover Content Creators Project in 4-H Online. This project will run from Friday, July 8, 2022, through Friday, September 16, 2022. Information on how to get started will be available the week prior to the project start date. FAQ’s

Q. Do I need expensive camera equipment and video editing software to complete this project?

A. No! When it comes to cameras, use what you have. There are also a handful of free and free-to-try software programs that will meet your needs. We’ll cover this in more detail once you’re in the project.

Q. When will project meetings be held?

A. This project won’t have formal meetings. Members will be able to complete each module at their convenience, as long as it’s during the week that that module is active. Instead of mandatory project meetings, virtual meetups will be held once a week. Attendance will NOT be required, and members will be able to login/out as they please. Meetups are only meant to provide an opportunity for socialization and discussion and for those that may need help. Meetups will be scheduled after registration closes and members will be polled to help choose the day and time that works best for most people.

Q. How long will each virtual meetup be?

A. Each virtual meetup will last 1-hour.
