2022-2023 Record Book

The 2021-2023 edition of the Record Book Manual and Forms are available. There are no changes from the 2021-2022 edition to this two-year edition. All manuals and forms can be used for both program years.

Find the Manual and all Forms for 4-H Record Books

All members are encouraged to complete the 4-H Record Book.

- ⇒ Completing the Personal Development Report (PDR) is required to receive awards based on 4-H Record Book achievements (star ranking, leadership pins, and other medals)
- ⇒ The Annual Project Report (APR) is used to document specific project experiences, An APR needs to be completed for each project, and is required to receive credit for the project. An APR is also required to participate in the Trinity County Fair.

Example of "Annual Project Report: Learning Experiences" Box:

In the "Learning Experiences" Box, record every project-related activity or event where you learned something new or developed a skill.

Explain what you did, what you learned, and the skills you gained in the project.

Include the level of participation: I = Individual, L = Local Club/Unit/Project, C = County, M = Multi-county/Area, S = State, N = National/Multi-State, G = Global

In 2019-2020, California 4-H youth completed a total of 217,070 4-H projects!




Trinity County Fair Market Project Participation

Now that the details associated with the 2022 Trinity County Fair are wrapping up I started to reflect on the number of youth positively impacted by the fair through the market animal program as compared to the number of youth enrolled locally in 4-H. In 2022, 82 4-H youth exhibited and sold livestock at the fair. The number of lots trended up this year. Figure A outlines the total number of lots sold at the fair between 2006 and 2022.



Youth can participate in this program as 4-H, FFA, Grange, or Independent exhibitors. Determining the number of exhibitors is a little challenging in that participants can sell two animals. Exhibitors were only counted once regardless of number of lots sold annually. The number of exhibitors trended up this year. Figure B outlines the number of exhibitors locally.



It is interesting to look at the importance of market animal projects. In the 2021/22 program year, there were 111 youth participating in 4-H in Trinity County. Of these, 14 were primary members (recall they cannot participate in market animal projects). About 84% of the 97 members that can participate in animal projects chose to do so. It is our hope that as we ease out of the pandemic more youth will participate in projects outside of the market animals. Figure C shows the percent of total enrollment of youth choosing to participate in market animal projects.



This underscores that market animal projects remain an important component of the 4-H program locally and are a valuable youth engagement opportunity. As population and demographics in the county change we need to understand the educational needs of local youth and look for opportunities to address these needs.

2022 UC 4-H Scholarships for Higher Education



The UC 4-H Youth Development Program is committed to promoting higher education. With help from donors, statewide scholarships are available for graduating high school seniors and college-attending students.

8 scholarships are available through UC 4-H, and can be used for qualified educational expenses such as tuition, books, and other required fees.

One application applies for all scholarships available. Applications are due September 5, 2022.

FSA Youth Loan

Opportunity for Financing for Livestock Projects

The US Department of Agriculture's Farm Service Agency (FSA) makes operating loans of up to \$5,000 to eligible individual rural youths age 10 through 20 to finance income-producing, agriculture-related projects.

The project must be of modest size, educational, and initiated, developed and carried out by youths participating in 4-H clubs, FFA, or a similar organization. The project must be an organized and supervised program of work. It must be planned and operated with the assistance of the organization advisor, produce sufficient income to repay the loan, and provide the youth with practical business and educational experience in agriculture-related skills.

These loans can finance many kinds of income-producing agricultural projects. The loan funds may be used to:

- Buy livestock, seed, equipment and supplies
- Buy, rent or repair needed tools and equipment
- Pay operating expenses for the project

Korson Coulter Memorial Livestock Project Scholarship

The scholarship is open to youth 9 - 18 years of age that reside in Trinity County and are involved in producing a livestock project for the Trinity County Fair.

The scholarship is in memory of Korson Coulter. Korson was a 4-H member in Trinity County for six years. He competed in showmanship and market class competitions with turkeys, rabbits and goats. He was a champion showman with every species he raised. Korson raised and showed the first Grand Champion Market Goat at the Trinity County Fair. He also held the highest top showman award, Round Robin Champion for both Large and Small Animals in the same year.

Korson was always eager to help anyone with anything that needed to be done, always there to lend a hand, and always continued to ask questions and learn from others to be the very best at whatever he set out to do.

- * \$500 scholarship with a \$100 pay-it-forward payment made to the Korson Coulter Memorial Scholarship fund 40 days after the Trinity County Fair
- * Recipients cannot receive the scholarship two consecutive years
- * Funds may only be used to purchase and care for a project animal
- * All requirements for the livestock project must be met, and a 4-H leader or FFA advisor must oversee the project

California 4-H Shooting Sports and AB 2571



Shooting Sports

California Assembly Bill 2571 (AB 2571) was signed into law on June 30, 2022. This bill prohibits a firearm industry member from advertising or marketing any firearm-related product in a manner that is designed, intended, or reasonably appears to be attractive to minors.

The University of California legal counsel conducted an analysis of the new law in regards to the UC ANR 4-H Program and its activities.


